

The cliché is that prostitution is the oldest profession. Isn't it time that the subject received a full reference treatment?

This major 2-volume set is the first to treat in an inclusive reference what is usually considered a societal failing or the underside of sexuality and economic survival. The A-to-Z encyclopedia offers wide-ranging entries related to prostitution and the sex industry, past and present, worldwide and in the US. The narrative entries illuminate prostitution's impact on the arts, sexuality, social mores, popular culture, and more.

This wide-ranging work is targeted to the general reader, who will gain useful insight into the human race through time. The introduction addresses the scope of prostitution from the earliest historical records. To help the reader find entries of interest, there are user-friendly lists, alphabetically and topically arranged, and a comprehensive index. A chronology proffers significant dates related to the topic. Each entry is signed, with suggestions for further reading. The 179 contributors and advisors to this project come from diverse geographical areas and fields of study. She is editor of the annual journal *Research for Sex Work*. In 2003, she was principal investigator for "Revolving Door," the first report released by the Urban Justice Center's Sex Workers Project. She has spoken about prostitution, migration rights and research ethics at the United Nations, the International Conference on HIV/AIDS, Columbia University, Cornell University, Hong Kong City University and numerous academic and political conferences.
